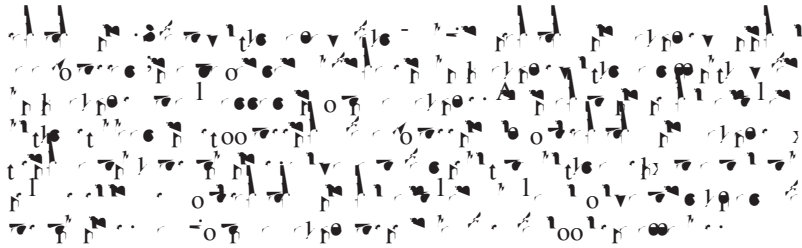

In 1991 and 1992, the Kurds in northern Iraq were the only ethnic group in the region that was not subject to the violence and displacement that characterized the rest of the country. This relative stability was the result of a unique arrangement between the Kurds and the Iraqi government, which allowed the Kurds to govern their own affairs in the north while remaining part of the Iraqi state.

THE BREAKUP OF COOPERATION AMONG MODERATES, 1991-1992

As a result of the 1991-1992 crisis, the Kurds in northern Iraq were able to establish a de facto autonomous region. This region was governed by the Kurdistan Regional Government (KRG), which was formed by a coalition of moderate and radical Kurdish groups. The KRG was recognized by the United States and other major powers, and it was able to maintain a degree of stability and order in the north. However, the KRG's relationship with the Iraqi government was tenuous, and it was subject to periodic violence and displacement.
